5: of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) Drug Experts Group in order to

6: combat the sale and growth of drugs in ASEAN member states.

7: B) 5 billion dollars of the appropriation shall be used by ASEAN Human

8: Rights Mechanism to prevent human rights abuses in ASEAN member

9: states.

10: Section 3: The Department of the Treasury, in conjunction with USAID, will

11: enforce and monitor this legislation. Improper use of funds will result in

12: the revocation of all monies.

13: Section 4: This bill shall take effect immediately upon passage.

14: Section 5: All laws or portions of laws conflicting with the provisions of this

15: legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.

- 11: Security between the United States and Japan be revoked and US military restrictions
- 12: on Japan be lifted.

(Alternate Bill – May be used only if all other legislation is used)

A Bill to Reform and Strengthen the U.S. Economy

1: Section I: With the exception of defense spending, all government services and
2: expenditures are hereby ended. Examples of services and expenditures include, but are
3: not limited to, Social Security, Infrastructure, Medicare, Medicaid, IRS, etc.

4: Section II: The national debt is to receive a final, unchangeable cap of \$15 trillion

5: Section III: The national budget must always be balanced. Emergency spending and

6: resulting deficit spending are permitted, so long as the spending is repaid within

7: five (5) years of use. In addition, all emergency spending must be noted on, but not

8: necessarily added to, the budget for the fiscal year after use.

9: Section IV: A national flat tax of 15% is hereby implemented on all citizens.

10 Section V: All government revenue, after defense spending, is to go to reducing the

11: national debt. Once the national debt reaches \$0, social services may be

12: re-implemented when enough funds are available.

13: Section VI: All non-emergency measures must be approved by the Congressional Budget

14: Office.

15: Section VII: This reform will occur five (5) years after this bill is signed into law

16: Section VIII: All laws in opposition to this bill are rendered null and void.
